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#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MoU") is made and entered into by University of Malawi ("UNIMA") and Zakudimba Farmers' Cooperative ("ZFC"), individually referred to as "Party", and collectively as "the Parties", as required by context, with the objective of promoting their collaboration in education, research and development in rural innovation and agricultural extension, agribusiness and entrepreneurship, and agri-food systems and nutrition.

#### WHEREAS,

- A. UNIMA is a public Higher Education Institution (HEI) committed to imparting knowledge and developing skills by engaging in teaching and learning, research and innovation, consultancy, and outreach activities in response to community and national needs. UNIMA hosts a Centre for Resilient Agri-Food Systems (CRAFS), established with funding from the World Bank, through the Government of Malawi, under the Eastern and Southern Africa Higher Education Centres of Excellence Additional Financing (ACE II AF) project.
- B. Zakudimba Farmers' Cooperative (ZFC) is a small-scale farmers' cooperative, with a total membership of 5000 small scale farmers. ZFC is based in Thyolo District, Malawi and specializes in value addition to horticulture products. ZFC has a history of working with public institutions in Malawi in value addition, including the University of Malawi, through their long-term link with Byumbwe Agriculture Research Station.
- C. The Parties wish to collaborate in areas of mutual interest to enhance effectiveness of delivery of their shared mission in education, research and development, rural innovation and agricultural extension aimed at resilient and sustainable agri-food systems. ZFC, as a partner at small scale industry level, will contribute to the community level-field and practical aspects. ZFC farmer members will gain from the training offered through CRAFS and also from the systems, innovations, and technologies that the CRAFS and its partners will develop and pilot.

#### THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

#### 1. PURPOSE

1.1 This MoU sets out the terms under which the Parties shall collaborate to strengthen their teaching and learning, community participatory research and development, and rural innovation and agricultural extension activities, including, describing the partnership goals

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and objectives, outlining roles and responsibilities, setting forth resource contributions, the governance structure, and the period of performance.

## 2. AREAS OF COLLABORATION

- 2.1 The areas of cooperation may include, subject to mutual consent, any feasible activity that would further the goals of each Party.
- 2.2 Parties may offer to each other opportunities for activities that will foster a collaborative relationship. The Parties contemplate cooperation in a variety of joint research and education, teaching and learning, and community outreach activities such as:

## A. Community-based research and intervention

- Co-development and co-implementation of community-based research projects:
   The Parties commit to work collaboratively in community participatory research in rural innovations, agricultural extension aimed at resilient and sustainable agrifood systems.
- 2. Student and Staff exchange: the ZFC agrees to host postgraduate students from UNIMA and both Parties agree to host staff/members from the other Party to enable them to take courses, conduct research and seminars, or have access to laboratory facilities and equipment.
- 3. Access to technical and professional services: the Parties agree to provide each other access to their professional and technical resources for development and showcasing of rural interventions.

#### B. Teaching and learning

4. The Parties will partner in training rural communities, with a special target of women and youth. ZFC will contribute to the community level-field and practical aspects, as a partner at small scale industry level. Whenever possible, short courses or part of courses will be team taught by staff/members from the Parties.

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#### 3. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES

- 3.1 The Parties shall work together in a coordinated effort to bring about the fulfilment of the purpose of this MoU.
- 3.2 The Parties undertake to seek funding including donor funds and research grants independently or jointly, for the purpose of realizing any or all the objectives of the collaboration.
- 3.3 The Parties shall abide by current international guidelines on good research practice and ethics available in relation to all research activities. Community-based research projects need to have an emphasis on the local relevance, considering the social, economic, and cultural conditions and the ways in which these affect lifestyle, behaviour, and community decision-making.
- 3.4 The Parties agree that community-based research projects are designed in ways which enhance the capacity of the community-based participants in the process.
- 3.5 Representatives of community and ZFC are involved as appropriate in all major phases of the research process, e.g., defining the problem, developing the data collection plan, gathering data, using the results, interpreting, sharing, and disseminating the results, and developing, implementing, and evaluating plans of action to address the issues identified by the research.
- 3.6 Community-based research projects are conducted according to the norms of partnership: mutual respect; recognition of the knowledge, expertise, and resource capacities of the participants in the process; and open communication.
- 3.7 Develop and conduct an orientation to the project for partners, staff and community members and co-supervise community organizing staff in planning and conducting community forums.
- 3.8 Provide resources and technical assistance in activities supporting the design and implementation of assessment, data collection, and evaluation systems, and the dissemination of results to the community.

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- 3.9 Ensure that there is ongoing communication between the ZFC, its members, the community and UNIMA by sharing information regularly and frequently.
- 3.10 Participate in the process of design, implementation, data collection, analyzing and translating the data collected to guide the efforts of the community-based research projects.
- 3.11 Provide necessary training on an ongoing basis to community organizing staff and Administrative Assistant.
- 3.12 Parties shall make rules governing the use of their respective facilities including laboratories, library, and workshops where such facilities are used to conduct any of the functions of this collaboration.
- 3.13 Parties agree to make available suitable facilities and personnel as and when required and on such terms of rules above.
- 3.14 Parties shall seek waiver of fee applicable on any equipment and materials for use by students and staff participating in this collaboration.
- 3.15 Generally, the title and custody of any equipment acquired during the collaboration shall remain with the host Party upon the expiry of that project as specified in individual 'agreements of collaboration' for the project.
- 3.16 Participating staff and students involved in any activities under this MoU shall adhere to the law of the host countries and rules and regulations of the host institutions.

#### 4. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE MoU

- 4.1 Agreements and activities, under this MoU, shall be subject to availability of funds and the approval of each Party's authorized representatives and all applicable laws and regulations of the country.
- 4.2 Prior to initiating any specific activity or program (described in Article 2), the parties will negotiate and enter into specific subsidiary agreements in writing, signed by each Party's authorized signatory, stating the respective rights and obligations of the Parties, terms of the arrangement such as intellectual property ownership and use of facilities (for research), credit transfer and prior knowledge (for student exchange) and funding issues.

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- 4.3 In case of any ambiguity or conflict of terms between the terms and conditions of this MoU and those of a separate agreement as mentioned above, the terms and conditions of such separate agreement shall prevail.
- 4.4 For the implementation of each specific case, Parties shall prepare a work program in relation to the ways, means and responsibilities that will be the object of the addendum to be signed by both parties.
- 4.5 Each Party shall designate a Coordinator to oversee and facilitate the implementation of any agreements arising out of this MoU. The coordinators will act as principal contact and plan together the activities under the MoU. The initial coordinators are Professor Cosmo Ngongondo, Executive Dean of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences for UNIMA and Mr Frank Banda, Chairman/CEO of ZFC. Notification of change or successor shall be in writing to the other Party.
- 4.6 Each Party shall be responsible for its acts and omissions in connection with this MoU and its implementation.
- 4.7 The Parties shall, on a regular basis, keep each other informed of and consult on matters of common interest, which in their opinion are likely to lead to mutual collaboration.
- 4.8 The Parties shall, at such intervals as deemed appropriate, convene meetings to review the progress of activities being carried out under the present MoU and to plan future activities.
- 4.9 The Parties shall use good faith efforts to settle administratively and amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of this MoU. Where the Parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the Parties.

#### 5. FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

5.1 Both Parties shall endeavour to raise funds from various sources in order to make possible the cooperation programs.

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- 5.2 Both Parties agree that all financial arrangements between the Parties have to be further negotiated and mutually agreed, and will depend on the availability of funds.
- 5.3 Any planned program will be affected only after adequate resources have been allocated to it.
- 5.4 Parties agree that this MoU does not entail any obligation for the Parties to fund any activities of the other Party.
- 5.5 Parties further agree to bear the cost of administering the programme on such terms as shall be mutually agreed upon from time to time.

#### 6. PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES

- 6.1 This MoU and any related agreements and project document comprise the complete understanding of the Parties in respect of the subject matter in this MoU and supersede all prior agreements relating to the same subject matter.
- 6.2 This MoU should not establish or create any type of formal agreement or obligation. Instead, it is an agreement between the Parties to work together in such a manner as to promote a mutually beneficial alliance between the Parties, in the support of an effective partnership to establish and maintain objectives and commitments with regards to all matters related to education, and research and development in added-value food products.
- 6.3 Waiver and forbearance or failure of a party in insisting in any one or more instances upon performance of any provisions of this agreement shall not be construed as a waiver or relinquishment of that party's rights to future performance of such provision and the other party's obligation in respect of such future performance shall continue in full force and effect.
- 6.4 The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this MoU shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision of the MoU. In the event any provision of this MoU is deemed invalid or unenforceable, or conflicting with the intent of this collaboration in whole or in part, that part shall be severed from the remainder of this MoU and all other provisions should continue in full force and effect as valid and enforceable.

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- 6.5 It is not the intent of this MoU to restrict the Parties to this Agreement from their involvement or participation with any other public or private individuals, agencies, or organizations.
- 6.6 The Parties may agree to add more participants to the MoU, if other Parties with a shared academic and research and development mission express interest to collaborate with both Parties, under the similar scope as this MoU.
- 6.7 The Parties agree to indemnify and hold harmless the other Party, its respective affiliates, officers, agents, employees, and permitted successors and assigns against any and all claims, losses, damages, liabilities, penalties, punitive damages, expenses, reasonable legal fees and costs of any kind or amount whatsoever, which result from the negligence of or breach of this MoU by the indemnifying party, its respective successors and assigns that occurs in connection with this MoU. This section remains in full force and effect even after termination of the Agreement by its natural termination or the early termination by either party.
- 6.8 Unless all the Parties agree, no Party shall individually, and without prior notice and consent of the other Party, file or obtain any Intellectual Property Rights over any research materials, processes, or information under this MoU.
- 6.9 All intellectual property rights created by patent because of joint activity shall be shared by all Parties.
- 6.10 Regarding authors' rights, only co-investigators and other staff that have contributed significantly to the study planning, fieldwork, data analysis and write-up, will be included as co-authors, in accordance with the Vancouver Convention.
- 6.11 Any publications resulting from the Community-based research projects will acknowledge the contribution of participants, who will be consulted with prior to submission of materials and, as appropriate, will be invited to collaborate as co-authors. In addition, following the rules of confidentiality of data, participants will jointly agree on who has access to the research data and where the data will be physically located.

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- 6.12 Neither Party shall use the name, emblem or trademarks of the other party, or any its subsidiaries, and/ or affiliates, or any abbreviation thereof, without the express prior written approval of the other Party in each case.
- 6.13 The Parties agree to recognize and acknowledge this partnership, as appropriate. To this end, the Parties shall consult with each other concerning the manner and form of such recognition and acknowledgement.

## 7. COMMENCEMENT, REVIEW, RENEWAL AND TERMINATION

- 7.1 The proposed cooperation under this MoU is non-exclusive and will be effective from the date of the last signature here to and will remain in force for a period of five (5) years, with a possibility for renewal at the end of the five-year-period, subject to the Parties' written agreement.
- 7.2 If the MoU remains dormant for five consecutive years, it will be deemed to have lapsed.
- 7.3 Where it continues to be active the two Parties shall review the agreement 6 (six) months prior to the expiry date. If the parties are agreeable, then the MoU shall be extended in writing for such period as may be agreed upon.
- 7.4 The MoU may be amended or revised if both parties agree. Such amendments or revision shall be effective from the date of signature. Amendments may be decided at any time and shall be made in writing upon mutual consent of the parties.
- 7.5 Either Party may withdraw from this MoU provided written notification of the withdrawal is given to the other institution at least three (3) months prior to the desired withdrawal date.
- 7.6 In the event of termination of the MoU, any cost-sharing or project cooperation agreements, and any project documents concluded pursuant to this MoU, may also be terminated in accordance with the termination provision contained in such agreements. In such case, the Parties shall take the necessary steps to ensure that the activities carried out under the MoU, the agreements, and project documents are brought to a prompt and orderly conclusion.

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#### 8. FORCE MAJEURE

- 8.1 Either Party shall promptly notify the other Party, in writing, of any situation or event arising from circumstances beyond their control, which they could not have reasonably foreseen, and which make the performance of all or part of the Party's obligations under this contract impossible. Upon notification of the occurrence of such a situation or event, the performance of this contract shall be deemed to be postponed for a period of time equivalent to that caused by the Force Majeure and reasonable period not exceeding one (1) week thereafter shall be allowed for remobilisation to continue the performance of the contract.
- 8.2 Neither party shall be liable for any failure to fulfil its obligations under this agreement if and to the extent that such failure is caused by any circumstances beyond its reasonable control.
